DEF – that is, Days of European Film, offered high-quality, exclusively European films to the audience for the 29th year in a row, specifically in Prague from 6 to 13 April 2022 as well as in Ostrava, Brno and another 8 cities as part of Festival Echoes. The original film festival was transformed into a competition festival this year. The main competition focused on debuts, and in addition to that, the festival offered a competition section of music films. And the closing ceremony of DEF in the Přítomnost cinema in Prague on 13 April culminated with the announcement of the films, which received the BEST FILM DEBUT and BEST MUSIC FILM awards. DEF keeps returning to cinemas every year and, as suggested by this year's visual featuring the Phoenix rising from the ashes, it was at full strength once again!

OPENING OF THE 29TH DEF

On 6 April, DEF was opened by Miss Viborg - an unconventional Danish comedy about a sixty-year-old lady who roams a small town on her electric scooter, selling opioids. CLOSING CEREMONY OF 29TH DEF



















































On 13 April, the ceremonial closing of the festival in the Přítomnost cinema culminated with the announcement of the films, which received the BEST FILM DEBUT and BEST MUSIC FILM awards. The panel of judges for the main competition of debuts gave the award to the Swedish drama Clara Sola. The panel of judges for music films chose the Estonian music portrait u.Q. by Ivar Murd. The film awards were received from judges Tomáš Baldýnský and Pavel Turek by Margus Õunapuu, a producer of u.Q., and by **Ruben De Gheselle**, the author of music for *Clara Sola*.

COMPETITION SECTION OF DEBUTS AND MUSIC FILMS

This year, for the first time, DEF was a competition festival. The main competition presented the debuts included in the "For the First Time" section, while the second competition focused on music films included in the "Film and Music" section. The audience were able to vote on the films as part of the pan-European LUX Audience Award event. Thus, the ceremonial closing of DEF in the Prague-based Přítomnost cinema held on 13 April culminated with the announcement of the films, which received the BEST FILM DEBUT and BEST MUSIC FILM awards. The panel of judges for the main competition of debuts, chaired by Tomáš Baldýnský, gave award to the Swedish drama Clara Sola by director Nathalie Álvarez Mesén about the journey of a woman through the wilderness of Costa Rica who is trying to set herself free of social and religious conventions. The panel of judges for music films, chaired by Jan P. Muchow, chose u.Q., an unusual Estonian musical portrait by Ivar Murd, highlighting the troubled life of an Estonian adventurer.

The BEST MUSIC FILM award was handed over by Pavel Turek, a music critic and a cultural editor. "Together with Tomáš Baldýnský, we agreed that it was a joy to watch all those films, most of which were based on a generational conflict, but all the films in this competition selection were actually about reconcilement of generations through music." On behalf of director Ivar Murd, the award was personally received by producer Margus Õunapuu who closed his acceptance speech with the following words: "The biggest thanks goes to Uku Kuut, the main character of our film, who unfortunately did not live to see the release of the film or this award because he died in 2017, and that says it all." Director Ivar Murd















































made an online appearance and said the following message in his video greeting: "The festival looks absolutely fantastic but, regrettably, I cannot be with you in person because I am just opening a new cinema in Tallinn, from which I am now sending you my regards. I am very happy that our film was successful; this is our first award! We thank you very much!"

The BEST FILM DEBUT award was handed over by screenwriter and producer Tomáš Baldýnský, the chairman of the five-member panel of judges: "I would like to thank very much for the selection of films; they were beautiful. They were all debuts but there was absolutely nothing that would give it away. They were very self-confident films, which told difficult stories with effortlessness, as if all of it were easy. Each film provided insight into a somewhat different culture, and it was a powerful experience in this respect, too; almost like when you are on a vacation and learn the ways in which we are different and in which we are the same..." On behalf of director Nathalie Álvarez Mesén, the award was accepted by Ruben De Gheselle, the author of the music: "I very much appreciate the award and I thank the panel of judges who liked our film, which is so remote from Prague." Director Nathalie Álvarez Mesén, who was unable to attend the award ceremony in person because she was just in the middle of making another film, sent her greeting: "It is incredible and I am beyond happy. I thank you very much for this award."

The main DEF competition presented debuts included in the "For the First Time" section, which disrupt the old ways and wish to have their own voice be heard. The DEF competition programme for the best European debut of the year thus consisted of daring films of the upcoming generation of film-makers.





















































Šimon Šafránek, the DEF's programming director, additionally comments on the selection of films: "In the competition of European debuts, we screened a total of 9 films, including the opening subversive comedy Miss Viborg by Danish director Marianne Blicher. The Belgian film Rookie offered unusual relationship solutions. The toxic power of ubiquitous algorithms of social networks was attacked by the Romanian satire #dogpoopgirl as well as by the visually liberating Swiss sci-fi Youth Topia. Extreme conditions of the human soul were examined by the Irish horror film You Are Not My Mother as well as by the Hungarian communist era drama **Erasing Frank** about a musician in the jaws of the totalitarian machinery. The film had won acclaim at the Venice Film Festival. No less than three competition films examined a departure from rationalism and a shift towards esotericism: Traditional art of healing played a role in the film **Holy Emy** about girls from a Philippine community in Athens, Greece, directed by Araceli Lemos. This film won special recognition in the competition of debuts at the festival in Locarno. Mysticism found its place here, too: Chema Garcia Ibarra made the film The Sacred Spirit about a society of ufologists whose esteemed chairman died and left behind a bold plan as his legacy. This film also won special recognition in Locarno, specifically in the main competition. And for the third time: the Swedish drama **Clara Sola** by director Nathalie Álvarez Mesén takes place in a remote village in Costa Rica, where a 36-year-old Clara embarks on a journey to set herself free of social and religious conventions and to claim her sexuality and new-found powers. Among other things, this film had competed for Golden Camera in Cannes and received our BEST FILM DEBUT award."

Šimon Šafránek, the DEF's programming director, adds: "In an international premiere, we presented an avant-garde musical search for the legacy of one's own parents in **Spectre: Sanity, Madness & the Family**. French music producer Para One debuts as a director of this film. Limits of sounds were challenged by Johannes Grenzfurthner in a claustrophobic horror film **Masking Threshold**. Live action films were also represented by the trap delirium **Lovely Boy** by Francesco Lettieri, which already captured interest at the festival in Venice. The programme also included several unusual musical portraits: **Poly Styrene** is the story of the first non-white British female punk singer-songwriter; the film was directed by her daughter Celeste Bell. The film From the 84 Days then reflects on the creative spirit during the Covid pandemic, with director Philipp Hartmann following Bolivian musicians who were stranded in Germany for three months due to a lockdown. The winner of the BEST MUSIC FILM award was u.Q. by Ivar Murd, which shows the troubled life of Estonian adventurer Uku Kuut who performed in a duo with his mother."

PANEL OF JUDGES / In the main competition of debuts and in the competition of musical films, decisions were made by a five-member panel of judges and a three-member panel of judges, respectively. The chairman of the panel of judges for the competition of debuts was Tomáš Baldýnský, a Czech film critic, actor, producer, screenwriter and script editor. This panel of judges also included producer Kristina Hejduková, film critic Marta Balaga, Irish director and writer Mike Ahern and Czechoslovakian Film Database founder Martin Pomothy.

The 29th DEF screened films, which would not otherwise have found their way to Czech cinemas. In a total of 6 programme sections covering a broad range of topics, DEF presented distinctive debuts, award-winning films from prestigious festivals, animated films, films for a younger audience and families with children as well as documentaries and films by old



PROGRAMME SECTIONS

Stars / These films received awards at renowned festivals, were made by world-renowned creators and feature celebrities of European cinema. A selection of contemporary films nobody should miss out on.

Šimon Šafránek, the DEF's programming director: "As Czech prepremieres, we screened the period drama The Sign Painter (8Heads Productions in collaboration with Klara Khine Distribution) by Viesturs Kairišs about a painter of signs in a city where historical events take place; the cheerful French musical comedy Tralala (Film Europe) starring Mathieu Amalric; as well as the adaptation of a novel by Honoré de Balzac Lost Illusions (Film Europe) directed by Xavier Giannoli, which triumphed at this year's French César Awards. Within the Stars section, we also presented three films nominated for the Lux award. The animated refugee drama **Flee** (Film Europe) by Jonas Poher Rasmussen had received the European Film Awards in both documentary and animated film categories. The main award at the same ceremony had been received by a reflection on the Srebrenica massacre Quo Vadis, Aida? (Aerofilms) made by Jasmila Žbanić, a renowned film-maker. In Great Freedom, director Sebastian Meise shows a man who is repeatedly imprisoned for homosexuality in post-war Germany. The film received the Jury Prize in Cannes in the Un certain regard section."

Extreme conditions of the human soul were examined by the Irish horror film You Are Not My Mother as well as by the Hungarian communist era drama **Erasing Frank** about a musician in the jaws of the totalitarian machinery. Film & Music – competition of music films / Tones and melodies set the rhythm in the competition section focused on avant-garde, documentaries and live action films where music plays the lead role.

Šimon Šafránek, the DEF's programming director: "Film and Music is a traditional section of DEF and this year, it was also a competition section. In an international premiere, we presented an avant-garde musical search for the legacy of one's own parents in Spectre: Sanity, Madness & the **Family**. French music producer Para One debuts as a director of this film. Limits of sounds are challenged by Johannes Grenzfurthner in a claustrophobic horror film **Masking Threshold**. Live action films were also represented by the trap delirium Lovely Boy by Francesco Lettieri, which had already captured interest at the festival in Venice. The programme also included several unusual musical portraits: u.Q. by Ivar Murd, which shows the troubled life of Estonian adventurer Uku Kuut who performed in a duo with his mother. Poly Styrene is the story of the first non-white British female punk singer-songwriter; the film was directed by her daughter Celeste Bell. To the Point: No Parents / First loves, fears and the magical power of friendship. Films focusing on the present-day lives of children and adolescents. This is a traditional section made in collaboration with the Representation of the European Commission in the Czech Republic as part of the European Year of Youth.

















































Šimon Šafránek, the DEF's programming director: "Coming of age, sports and music. This was the theme of this section, which deliberately focuses on stories for adolescents and children. Debuting director Sarah Blasskiewitz depicts the struggle of step-sisters with racism in Leipzig in the film **Precious Ivie**, in which she relies on fantastic actress Lorna Ishema who received Lola, a German film award, for her performance. Chiara from the drama A Chiara (Aerofilms) by Jonas Carpignano is also an adolescent girl who must grow up quickly. We screened the film in a Czech prepremiere. The pre-premiere of Leave No Traces (Aerofilms) by Jan P. Matuszyński showed a boy's perspective of coming of age in troubled times. The events of this film take place in 1983 when young Jurek becomes the enemy of the Polish totalitarian regime overnight. A taste of rebellion is present in the life story of a phenomenal skateboarder shown in the film The Scars of Ali Boulala directed by Max Eriksson. Czech cinema was represented by award-winning animated films My Sun Mad (Aerofilms) by Michaela Pavlátová about the trials and tribulations of a Czech woman in Kabul and Even Mice Belong in Heaven (CinemArt) by Denisa Grimmová and Jan Bubeníček, which had received a Czech Lion award for an animated film and in addition to that, it can boast of the following awards: Anifilm 2021 – Audience Award, Jury's Special Recognition; 2021 Shanghai IFF - Best Animated Film; 2021 SCHLINGEL IFF for Children and Young Audience – Animated Feature Film Award, Club of Festivals Junior Award." The musical framework of the section was provided by 6 episodes from the documentary series RapStory (Czech Television) by Šimon Šafránek about the evolution of Czech rap.



There's a Hope / A programme focused on films, which search for life in harmony with nature and prompt questions regarding sustainability and environmentalism.

Šimon Šafránek, the DEF's programming director: "Music is also important in this section focusing on Nature. In their meditative film **The Velvet Queen**, directors Marie Amiguet and Vincent Munier follow two photographers who track a legendary beast. Original score for the film was composed by Nick Cave and Warren Ellis. **Songs for a Fox** by Kristijonas





















































animal or as a general symbol of desire."

MEDIA – Cold Blood / Horror, fantasy, blood and bizarreness. This was the theme of a collection of older but nonetheless still exciting and thrilling film stories, which DEF presented in the MEDIA – Cold Blood section. The section offered a selection of films, which were supported by the Creative Europe MEDIA programme. The Czech Creative Europe Desk – MEDIA is a partner of this section.

Vildziunas tell a story about a musician who retreats into wilderness where he succumbs to lucid dreaming. Untamed nature awakens vicious passions in people, as the divorced main character finds out in the drama **The Cabin** about travels around the Svalbard archipelago by debuting Jean-Louis Schuller, or as the diverse group of men trapped by a snow storm in a mountain cabin find out in the loose adaptation of the theatre play January by director Andrey Paounov. Specific relationships with their surrounding environments are cultivated by the old sailor who is unable to sail in **The Sailor** by director Lucie Kašová or the former taxi driver in the fragile portrait **Jack's Ride** by Susan Nobre. Willemiek Kluijfhout is looking for balance between the worlds of nature and people in the documentary **The Taste of Desire**, which concentrates on an oyster – whether as a rare

Šimon Šafránek, the DEF's programming director: "On a large screen, we presented the magical Oscar-winning Pan's Labyrinth by Guillermo del Toro about a girl who escapes from a present war to a fantastical but no less dangerous labyrinth. Echoes of war could also be heard in the sci-fi **Iron Sky** about a Nazi fortress on the dark side of the Moon by Timo Vuorensola. The programme also included the thriller **Thelma** about forbidden love, directed by Joachim Trier who is currently having a great success with the comedy The Worst Person in the World. The tension is also thick in the psycho-thriller **The Guilty** by director Gustav Möller where an ex-policeman races against time to rescue a kidnapped woman. The Nordic dominance is crowned by the comedy **Small Town Killers** by Ole Bornedal about how hiring a Russian hitman is cheaper than getting divorced."















































<u>Creative Europe</u> is an EU programme designed to support cultural and creative industries. The parts it consists of are MEDIA, Culture and an interdisciplinary part. The MEDIA part supports European cinema and the audio-visual industry.

"After the difficult period of the pandemic, culture awakens into a different world where new challenges await. One of them will also be access to financing. In this respect, support is offered by the European Union, which prepared an ambitious plan to support the revival of Europe in response to the pandemic. This plan includes support for the cultural sector to be provided through the Creative Europe programme. This programmes has already been running since 2021 with a record-high seven-year budget amounting to 2.4 billion EUR, which represents an increase by 64% as compared to the previous period. I believe that this support, too, will help ensure that cultural institutions of all kinds can not only restore their operation after a two-year downturn but can also regain their position in the life of a free civil society. On the background of the barbarities happening mere few hundred kilometres from us, it is more important than ever," added Dana Kovaříková, the Head of the European Commission Representation in the Czech Republic.



Film educational programmes for secondary schools and for elementary and middle schools

Every year, DEF prepares special educational programmes for schools. There were 3 films chosen from this year's festival films and they were combined with a suitable educational programme based on a relevant theme, which expanded the students' knowledge of the given theme that was appropriate for their age. School screenings took place in all festival cities; the accompanying programme took place predominantly in Prague or online. It was also possible to order a film without the accompanying programme.

FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS: Even Mice Belong in Heaven

The little mouse Supito likes to keep convincing everyone that she is the most courageous mouse in the whole wide world and is not afraid of absolutely anything. But the opposite is true.

Accompanying programme: workshop on the basics of animation

FOR SECONDARY SCHOOLS: *Erasing Frank*

The year is 1983 and the place is Budapest in the communist era. Frank sings in a banned punk band and the regime takes all the steps to silence him. Accompanying programme: The Institute for the Study of Totalitarian Regimes prepared a 90-minute educational programme for students, which was available online for free. Students got a general idea what a political trial meant and expanded their knowledge of what had been happening in the society in Czechoslovakia in the 1980s.

FOR MIDDLE SCHOOLS AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS: Precious Ivie

Step-sisters in Leipzig struggle with racism and with the search for their identities.

Once again, DEF was also online! All films were available on the SupremeXP platform during the period of the festival from 6 to 13 April. The price of viewing was CZK 80.

The price of the tickets to DEF screenings in Prague, Ostrava and Brno was CZK 130. The ticket price for seniors for all normal screenings was CZK 65. Online screening was offered by DEF for CZK 80. Ticket prices for the accompanying programme varied. Tickets could also be purchased online at www.dnyevropskehofilmu.cz, through the booking systems of cinemas or at the cinemas' box offices. Tickets could also be booked over the telephone or by e-mail. The audience were able to find more information on how to purchase tickets here.

The DEF catalogue was available online. Marija Petrinjac is the author of the concept, graphic design and trailer of the 29th annual edition of DEF. The film awards were authored by Zdeněk Vacek. In keeping with the tradition, Lukáš Rumlena was the host of the opening and closing ceremonies. / DEF screened a total of 40 films in a total of 114 screenings - 101 in cinemas and 13 online. / The total number of attendees to the 29th DEF exceeded 5,000 viewers.



This year's DEF visual featured the mythical bird Phoenix, a symbol of rebirth and renewal in the mythologies of many nations. It brings the hope of a new beginning and an almost mystical awareness of the unity of destruction and creation. Originally, it was only supposed to lift DEF from the ashes of lockdowns and quarantines but now it acquired many more meanings.
